Edenton needs furniture! Participants attending the second biennial Edenton Symposium this week (April 18-20) are being asked to help with the furnishing of the James I redell House, now one of the state's historic

Home of the noted Revolutionary leader and Supreme Court judge, the house, built circa 1775, stands as a monument to the early patriot. In 1949 the Edenton Tea Party Chapter, National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, purchased the house to save it from possible demolition. In 1951, the state of North Carolina assumed ownership and has maintained the house since with the cooperation of the DAR and James Iredell Association.

Restoration of the house is expected to be completed in the near future, and proper furnishings are a must. Since the James Iredell Association, the DAR, and the Division of Archives and History, like most restoration organizations, have limited funds, and

The Iredell House in because of the spiraling prices of antiques, it is nearly impossible for the groups to acquire quality furnishings that the Iredells might have owned. 
