Garden Time

Consider New Variety For Vegetable Garden

I remind my readers about the All-America Flower and Vegetable Selections for 1974. I have described them in earlier columns and will only briefly mention them here so that you can have seed available when planting time arrives, if you have not already attended to this.

Golderop snap bean. Yellow pods, crisp, productive and excellent for fresh use and quick freezing.

Table King bush acorn type squash. Aside from being outstanding for fresh use and storage for winter, this variety requires much less space in the garden than do the vining types.

Showboat marigold. From the information I have, this is the best variety of marigold yet introduced to the seed trade. You will want to try it. This variety is a triploid and it will be best to germinate the seed indoors and transplant to a sunny location outside.

Scarlet Ruffles zinnia — a vivid scarlet of the cut-and-come-again type liked by gardeners for arrangements or to enjoy in the garden.

Peter Pan Orange zinnia. Double flame-orange flowers measuring up to four inches. One of the best of the Peter Pans.

Magic Charms dianthus. This variety has the brightest colors yet produced in dianthus — scarlet, white, pink, salmon, crimson and two unusual bi-colors.

shining carmine-red plumes seven inches long and four inches wide.

If you plan to put any of your house plants outside when the weather warms up, do not knock them out of the pots. Plunge the pots in soil. Put a generous layer of coarse gravel under each pot to discourage root growth outside the pot. If the plants are removed from the pots the roots will penetrate the soil and repotting in the fall will not only be difficult but may result in the loss of plants.

Examine each plant before putting outside and if they have become root-bound, transplant to a larger pot before plunging in the soil.

Right now the weather is improving so get the cool season vegetable crops planted in the lower Piedmont and Coastal Plains. I gave a list of crops to be planted in a previous column.

FOOD STAMPS

Food stamps are just like money to the families who use them. So Mrs. Minnie B. Taylor, home economics extension agent, Perquimans County, offered a class in "Buying Power With Stamps."

Members from more than 50 families learned to use their stamps wisely, buying nutritional foods for their families. And they got tips on how to speed things up at the checkout counter.

Families also learned to budget their stamps so they would last through the month. Additional classes are taught once each month, Mrs. Taylor noted.
