

Two Hertford Residents Named To Advisory Council

Secretary James E. Harrington of the N.C. Department of Natural and Economic Resources and N.C. Coastal Resources Commission Chairman Thomas Eure announced Thursday appointment of the Coastal Resources Advisory Council. Two Hertford residents were among those appointed.

The Council is authorized by section of the Coastal Area Management Act passed by the 1974 General Assembly.

It consists of representatives of state and local government officials appointed by the Coastal Resources Commission and state and local government.

Tucker Is Elected To Clorox Board

Donald W. Tucker, a Hertford native, has been elected to the Board of Directors of The Clorox Company.

Tucker is Group Vice President-Technical and Manufacturing Services at Clorox, a position he assumed in March 1973. A graduate of Duke University, he joined Clorox in 1956 as a chemist at the company's Charlotte, North Carolina, plant. He later managed production facilities in Kansas City, Kansas, and Cleveland,

Ohio, prior to being named Manager of Manufacturing Services in 1966. Three years later, Tucker became Manager of Research and Development, a position he held until his election as Vice President-Research and Development in June 1970. In the latter post he assumed overall responsibility for all research and development staff functions for The Clorox Company and its subsidiaries.

A resident of Dublin, California, the new Clorox director is also active in civic and professional affairs. He presently serves as a director of the Oakland Chamber of Commerce as well as on the Household Division Steering Committee of the Soap and Detergent Association, and the East Oakland Task Force of the New Oakland Committee, a coalition of leaders in Oakland's business, labor and minority communities.

Christmas Mailing Dates

The Hertford Post Office reminds the public that Christmas mailing deadlines soon go into effect.

This is necessary because Nov. 1 is the deadline for surface and SAM (space available mail) to Armed Forces in the Near East.

SAM and PAL are two special ways to get the mail overseas. PAL (parcel air lift) mail may be 60 inches in length and girth and weigh up to 30 pounds. This will cost \$1 plus regular surface rates. SAM mail may be 60 inches in length and girth and way up to 15 pounds. This goes at regular surface rates.

Deadline for mailing surface parcels within the United States to assure delivery is Dec. 10. Greeting cards within the U.S., including Alaska and Hawaii, should be mailed no later than Dec. 15. Airmail parcels and letters within the U.S. except for Alaska and Hawaii may be mailed as late as Dec. 21.
