But rapid advances in automotive technology, and an ever-increasing demand for better, higher-powered cars soon left the local blacksmith standing beside his anvil in dismay. Engines became too complex to keep became too complex to keep running with stove bolts and bailing wire. They required people with specialized knowledge and skills. Today automobile manufacturers and their

supportive suppliers constitute the largest industry in the United States. Americans own and operate more cars than any country in the world. And more people are involved in the maintenance and repair

before — if they are available.

Good automotive mechanics are in short supply. College of The Albemarle is making an effort to alleviate this condition by providing trained mechanics for automobile dealers and garage owners in the Albemarle region.
