Food Stamp **Outreach Program Is Launched**

The Perquimans County Department of Social Ser-vices has launched a food stamp outreach campaign. Civic organizations, private industry, church related industry, church related groups, community action agencies are all requested to lend support. Additional volunteers are needed to assist in informational meetings, to inform people of eligibility, to provide of eligibility, to provide transportation, and to assist in numerous other ways. Mirs. Willie O. Harvey has been designated as coor-dinator for the outreach campaign in Percuimans campaign in Perquimans County. or by calling 426-7868. The food stamp program is designed to provide an adequate diet to families by extending food purchasing power. Eligible families receive a standard number of food stamps each month. depending upon the number of persons in the family. The

rice each head of the ousehold must pay depends pon family income from

any source. Currently there are 1100 persons in Perquimans County participating in this County participating in this program. It is estimated that over 3000 persons would be eligible if application were made. Many of those eligible for food stamp benefits are unaware of the assistance available to




