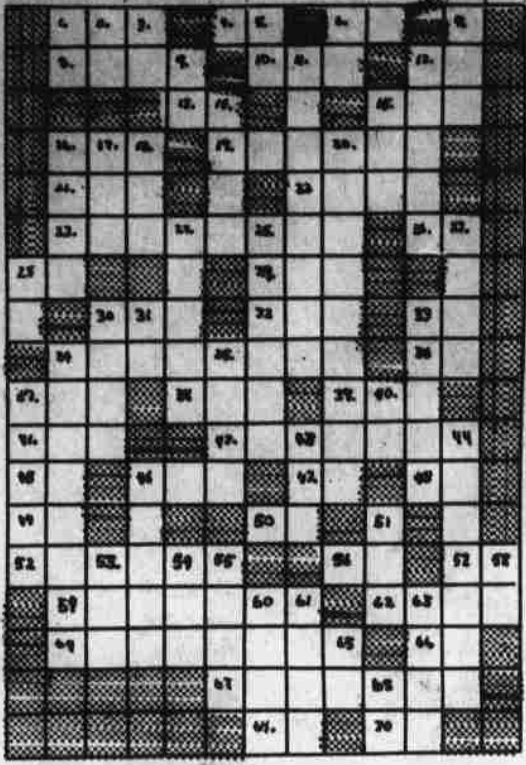


American States Crossword Puzzle
