

Heaviest Woods Hotter For Fireplace Heating

The amount of heat you get from your fireplace and how much you enjoy it can depend largely on the kind of wood used for fuel. Some types of wood are "hotter" than others.

North Carolina State University extension forest resources specialists point out that the heaviest woods tend to be the hottest burning woods.

Shagbark hickory and white oak are some of the hottest. Other high heat value woods in descending order are other hickories, black oak, beech, red oak, ash and southern yellow pine.

Dogwood, locust, hard maple and most fruit

woods are other desirable firewoods.

Resinous softwoods such as pine are not ideal fuel woods, because they burn too fast and spray sparks. A screen should be used to contain the sparks.

Any type of wood will burn better if it's split, and splitting is almost a necessity if you're trying to burn green wood.
