

Savings Gains Reported

Strong savings gains and a high level of mortgage lending activity characterized operations of Hertford Savings & Loan Association during 1977, according to H. Gene Boyce, secretary-treasurer of the association.

"In a review of 1977 results, Boyce said that savings deposits had increased by more than \$196,000 during 1977 and that total lending amounted to \$829,850.

As a result of the growth of savings deposits and mortgage loans, total assets at the end of the year amounted to \$3,723,008 according to Boyce.

Boyce said the past year had been one of tremendous activity in the residential real estate market and that the recovery in home building had been the main source of strength in the American economy.

Looking ahead to 1978, Boyce predicted that the

coming year would be a good year, although savings gains are expected to be somewhat small than in 1977.

"This may mean some tightening in the supply of mortgage funds," he said. "At the same time, the demand for mortgage funds will continue to be strong; quite clearly, most American families are convinced that a home represents the best 'hedge' against inflation."

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Machinery Act of 1971, GS. 105-308, Duty to list; penalty for failure.

Every person in whose name any property is to be listed under the terms of this sub-chapter shall list the property with the tax supervisor or proper list taker within the time allowed by law on an abstract setting forth the information required by this sub-chapter.

In addition to all other penalties prescribed by law, any person whose duty it is to list any property who wilfully fails or refuses to list the same within the time prescribed by law shall be guilty of a misdemeanor punishable by a fine not to exceed five hundred dollars (\$500.00) or imprisonment not to exceed six months. The failure to list shall be prima facie evidence that the failure was wilful.

Any person who removes or conceals property for the purpose of evading taxation or who aids or abets the removal or concealment of property for the purpose of evading taxation shall be guilty of a misdemeanor punishable by a fine not to exceed five hundred dollars (\$500.00) or imprisonment not to exceed six months.

PROPERTY TAX RELIEF FOR ELDERLY AND PERMANENTLY DISABLED PERSONS

G.S. 105-277.1 excludes from property taxes the first seven thousand five hundred dollars (\$7,500) in assessed value of certain property owned by North Carolina residents aged 65 or older or totally and permanently disabled whose disposable income does not exceed nine thousand dollars (\$9,000). The exclusion covers real property occupied by the owner as his or her permanent residence and/or household personal property used by the owner in connection with his or her permanent residence. Disposable income includes all moneys received other than gifts or inheritances received from a spouse, lineal ancestors, or lineal descendants.
