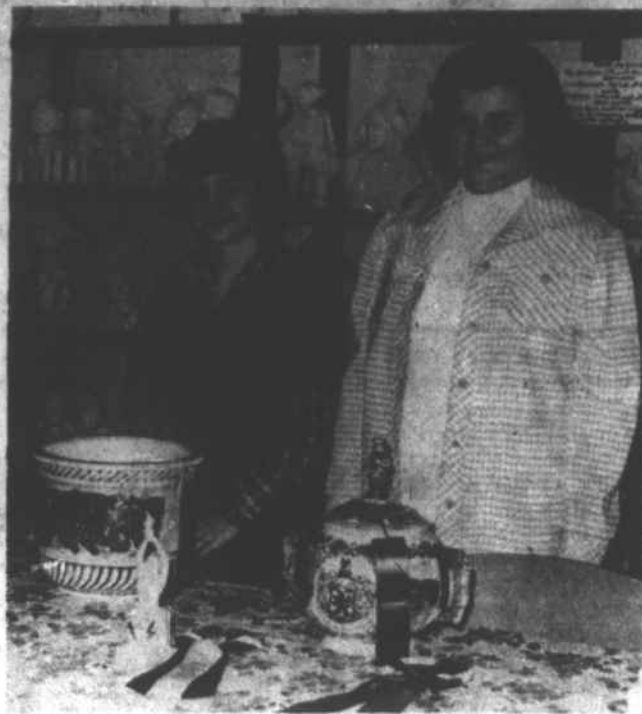

Students at J-Dee's place in show

J-Dee's Ceramics in Hertford was well represented at the Annual Ceramics Show held March 10-12 in Richmond, Va. The local students entered 58 pieces in this, the largest and most prestigious show held, and walked away with 38 ribbons representing excellence.

The big news came when Betty Ann Russell of Rt. 3, Hertford was awarded the Best of Show ribbon meaning her ceramic piece entered was judged best of all participating. Not only did Mrs. Russell provide recognition for J-Dees, but a young student, Kathy Glover of Hertford, was awarded the Best in Division for those in the 15-17 year old class.

J-Dee's has been operating in Hertford one year now by owners Jo and Claude Dixon. Over 100 students are involved each week in the classes offered. Both day and evening classes are available for both beginners and those advanced in ceramics.

Mrs. Dixon, who is instructor for the classes, expressed pride in the students' hard work which resulted in recognition for them.
