Nina White is chairman elect of the regional organization.

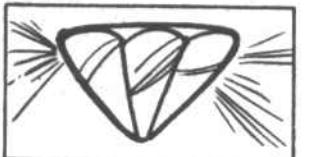
A slide presentation of the Heritage of Home Economics was presented. The celebration ended with the cutting of the birthday cake and an "Ode to Home Economics."

PBS telecast to highlight tax laws for older Americans

GREENSBORO — Tax laws, credits and deductions affecting taxpayers age 55 and older will be the subject of "Your Tax Return: 55 and Older Update," to be aired Sunday, March 25, from 3 to 4 p.m. on WUNC-TV Channel 4 from Chapel Hill and

WTVI Channel 42 from Charlotte.

Moderators for the special will be Mike Connors, television's "Mannix" and Lee Meriwether, a former Miss America who achieved fame on the "Barnaby Jones" TV series.

During the program, Internal Revenue Service tax assistants will be available on the toll-free number 1-800-424-1040 to answer viewer questions.

Some of the subjects that will be discussed on the program include the extra \$1,000 exemption allowed for taxpayers 65 or older and the special \$125,000 exclusion of gain on the sale of a residence by taxpayers age 55 or older.

The one-hour special will be closed-captioned for the hearing-impaired.
