Volunteers honored

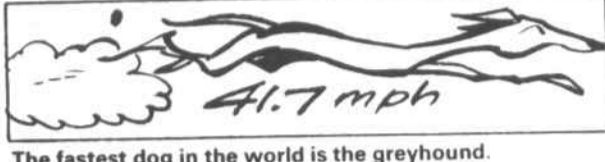

The citizens of the Town of Winfall are hereby informed that the Town intends to submit a Small Cities Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Application to the N.C. Department of Natural Resources and Community Development. The Town will apply for \$225,000 to undertake an economic development project. The Town intends to use these funds to provide a loan to Ward and Nixon Inc., for the purpose of constructing a warehouse employing 20 full time, permanent employees.
