Weight management course set

Edenton—LIFESTEPS, a 15-week weight management program developed by the National Dairy Council, will be offered at Chowan Hospital starting Tuesday, September 12.

The program, taught by Chowan Hospital Assistant Food Services Director, Karen Tynch, who has a masters degree in Food Nutrition, will feature topics to include: monitoring your eating, increasing physical activity, judging portion size, your eating style, and dealing with temptations.

Participants will develop a long-term eating and activity program through nutritionally adequate diet, behavior modification, and physical activity.

Grants offered by Edenton branch Northeastern Historic Places Office

Edenton—Applications are now being accepted by the Northeastern Historic Places Office (NEHPO) for grant funding through the 1989-90 Grants Program. The grants are offered annually by the North Carolina Department of Cultural Resources to non-profit historical groups in the northeastern region-NEHPO service area.

Proposals should reach the NEHPO Office on or before September 13, 1989, and funding requests should not exceed \$5,000. Proposals should contain a narrative describing the project, the historic property, the sponsoring organization, and an itemized project budget listing grant expenses.

Proposals may be delivered

or mailed to the Northeastern Historic Places Office, Post Office Box 759, Edenton, N.C. 27932. The NEHPO Office is located in the Barker House Visitor center on S. Broad Street. For additional information regarding application or available technical services call Mrs. Loraine Simpson at (919) 482-7325.

Some 75 grants have been awarded through past NEHPO Programs. Projects are selected for their educational value and potential impact on visitor services. Typical projects have included orientation programs, teacher workbooks, exhibits, interpretative and research projects, and brochures and other publications.

MEDICARE AND YOUR OPTOMETRIST

Since 1987, millions of elderly patients have been given the opportunity to continue optometric care, and to have Medicare pay for part of these services.

If you suddenly get pain in your eyes -- or headaches -- and your optometrist suspects glaucoma, the health portion and field tests of your eye examination are covered by Medicare. Generally, when an abnormal symptom or eye health complaint necessitates a visit to the optometrist's office, the eye health part of the examination will be paid for by Medicare.

Glasses and contact lenses are not covered by Medicare unless those glasses and contact lenses are required for post-cataract use. Sometimes, a number of prescription changes are required by the post-cataract patient. In those cases, Medicare will pay for more than one pair of glasses.

When you make your next optometric appointment, be sure to let the doctor know if you are eligible for Medicare.
