Elections director stepping down

Perquimans County's long-time elections director announced last week she plans to step down at the end of August.

Eula **Mae Forbes** spent 20 years heading the one-person county elections department. She



has no immediate plans on what to do next.

"I'm just at a time in my life where I wanted to see what else is out there," Forbes said Monday. "All my options are open.'

Forbes ushered Perquimans County from the world of paper ballots to the era of computer voting machines.

"Moving up with technology was important," Forbes said this week. "I was able to apply for grants and get the voting machines without any cost to Perquimans taxpayers and we moved from counting ballots by hand to what we have now.

Forbes submitted her resignation on July 1. The three-member county elections board is responsible for picking a replacement. That choice will have to be ratified by the State Board
