Changes to zoning on hold

Proposed amendements sent back to planning board

Prior to the scheduled Town Council meeting on Monday, there was a public hearing to discuss text amendments to provide more guidelines for principal and conditional use as well home occupations as it relates to zoning permits.

Hertford resident Edgar Salvo, who shared his extensive knowledge of the zoning code, asked council to refer the matter back to the Town's Planning/Zoning Board to better address inconsistencies he sees in the proposal

"I feel it's my civic duty to be involved when I see things that I feel are not correct or don't benefit the citizens of Hertford," he said.

After much discussion

In other news, Hertford Rotary co-president Karen Throckmorton has an interesting biography. A lot of the people that come to these parts from whereabouts have amazing stories.


