

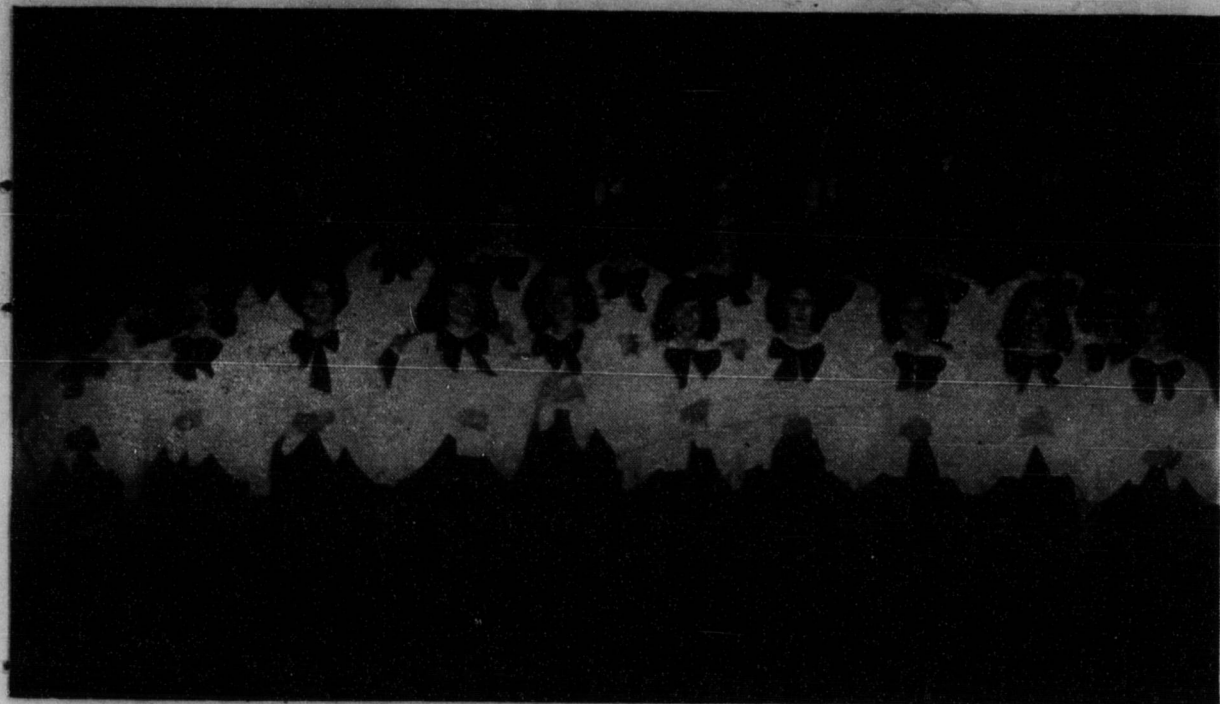

Mr. James Made Manager of Plant

Mr. John Leslie James, formerly Assistant Manager of the Erwin Cotton Mills Company Plant No. 3 in Cooleemee, has recently been made Manager of this plant, succeeding Mr. E. M. Holt.

Mr. James was graduated from North Carolina State College in 1927. While a student at State College, Mr. James spent his summer vacations working with the Aileen Mills at Biscoe and the Smitherman Cotton Mills at Troy, N. C. In July 1927, after graduating from college, he went with the Erwin Cotton Mills Company in Durham, working in various departments of the mill.

In May 1929, he went with the Burlington Mills in the Designing Department, and in June of 1930 he returned to the Erwin Cotton Mills as Assistant Overseer of No. 4 Card Room. In October 1930, he was made Overseer No. 4 Card Room. In October 1930, he was made Overseer of No. 4 Spinning, Winding and Warping, and in May 1932, he was made Superintendent of No. 1 Plant in Durham.

On May 4, 1941, he came to Cooleemee as Assistant Manager of No. 3 Plant.

Lewis Made Head of Production Standards

R. H. Lewis, Jr., has recently been named Director of Production Engineering for all the Company plants.
