

Safety Contest For 1948 To Run For Entire Year

The new inter-plant safety contest got under way on January 5, 1948. Glenn Penland, the safety director, has announced. Unlike previous contests, this year's safety contest will continue for a period of twelve months, ending on December 31, 1948.

As in previous contests, departments making the greatest improvement in their frequency rate or maintaining a perfect record in 1948 as compared with 1947 record, will be eligible for departmental awards. This year's awards will consist of giving the departments making the greatest percentage improvement in their frequency rate, or maintaining a perfect record, a special dinner and the plant having the best frequency rate will be given the annual safety trophy.

Interest in this year's competition is already keen and from all signs it appears that the contest this year should be one of the most successful of any which have been held. "Safety is its own reward and safe practices give the workers untold benefits each day. Lack of safety causes only pain and regret. Most accidents in industry and at home are due to carelessness. Most of our employees are learning the truth in these statements and are taking pride in their departmental safety records," states Mr. Penland in discussing the contest with the Editor-in-chief.

Each of the plant superintendents in the company organization has stated that he is out to win the safety award for the year, so it looks as if the purchasing department is going to have to order a plaque for each plant if the workers cooperate to keep their frequency rates to nearly zero. With such an attitude and cooperation, the employees will indeed make 1948 a safe year in each plant.

The National Safety Council slogan is one which each employee will doubtless give some thought to adoption: "BE CAREFUL — THE INJURY YOU PREVENT MAY BE YOUR OWN." If they do, then accidents due to carelessness will be entirely eliminated points out the safety committee members.

From time to time notices will be posted on the safety bulletin boards throughout the plants for the purpose of showing departmental standings. The newspaper will carry the standings each month.

Safety Plaque Awarded Plant 1 For 1947 Record

A silver plaque has been ordered to honor Plant No. 1 employees for having maintained the lowest accident frequency rate during 1947. During the past year, Plant No. 1 worked a total of 772,780 man hours with only one lost time injury. This time losing injury occurred on December 17, when an employee lost a part of his finger while "testing the tightness of a belt while the machine was running." This was the first lost time injury for the plant since May 31, 1946.

However, while enjoying the record of only one lost-time accident, Plant No. 1 had a total of 35 medical cases requiring the attention of a doctor. The frequency rate for this unit, the lowest of any in the production organization, was 1.2 for 1947.

But in spite of how bad these figures may seem, Plant No. 1 enjoys a very good record. Such a mark shows that the needless pain and suffering caused by accidents can be eliminated by the cooperative attitudes as displayed by the supervision and the employees toward the prevention of accidents.


Mrs. J. L. James Hostess To Woman's Club
