Pair To Receive Honors At A&T Commencement

GREENSBORO -- John H. Johnson, a nationally prominent publishing executive, and Dr. Russell Mawby, a leader in educational philanthropy, have been selected to receive honorary degrees during the 83rd annual commencement exercises at A&T State University on May 5.

The baccalaureate-commencement exercises will be held in the Greensboro Coliseum beginning at 11 a.m.

Johnson is president, publisher and editor of Johnson Publishing Company, Inc., headquartered in Chicago, but with branches in New York, Washington, D.C. and Los Angeles. He will receive a doctor of humane letters degree.

Johnson's company publishes Ebony and Jet magazines, both with circulations of several million readers.

Two years ago, Johnson opened a new \$8 million building to house his business in downtown Chicago and also purchased Radio Station WGRT.

In 1972, the Arkansas native became the first black to be named "Publisher of the Year" by the Magazine Publishers Association.

He has undertaken goodwill trips abroad for both Presidents Kennedy and Johnson. He attended the University of Chicago and Northwestern University and holds more than 10 honorary degrees. Mawby will receive a doctor of laws degree.

Mawby is being cited by A&T for his role in directing the huge Kellogg Foundation's efforts of assisting the development of public black colleges and universities.

The foundation, under Mawby's leadership, has granted to these colleges approximately \$2 million since 1968, including two significant gifts to A&T totaling nearly \$400,000. The foundation is located in Battle Creek, Michigan.

A native of Grand Rapids, Michigan, Mawby has served as president of the Kellogg Foundation since 1970. A graduate of Michigan State University, he holds the M.S. degree from Purdue University and the Ph.D. degree from Michigan State.

Mawby has served as an extension specialist at Michigan State University before joining the Kellogg Foundation in 1965. He also taught at the Cornell

University and was a consultant for the University of Nigeria. He is a member of the board of directors of the National 4-H Club Foundation.

Ethiopian visitor Planning Friday Talk At WSSU

WINSTON-SALEM -- Dr. Assefa Mehretu, Director of the Institute of Development Research of Haile Sellassie I University in Ethiopia will speak at Winston-Salem State University in Coltrane Hall on Friday, April 26.

At 11 a.m. Dr. Mehretu will speak on "Student Participation in Research on Rural Development", and at 2 p.m. on Research Priorities at Haile Sellassie I University.

Dr. Mehretu, a former Fulbright Fellow who earned the Ph.D. degree at John Hopkins University, comes to Winston-Salem State under the sponsorship of the Overseas Liaison Committee of the American Council on Education as a part of its International Seminar Series. His specialties include Economic Geography, Re-

gional Planning, Location Theory and Regional Economics and Population and Demographic Studies.

He will speak at Georgetown University, North Carolina State University, North Carolina Central University.

The International Seminar Series is intended as a service to both the academic community and the visiting scholars. It brings international visitors to small institutions with ethnic enrollments, enables the scholars to become acquainted with a range of U.S. institutions of higher education and provides U.S. area specialists with an opportunity to explore current research priorities.

Dr. C. B. Hauser and Mrs. Elizabeth Sumner will serve as hosts to Dr. Mehretu.

Poet Nikki Giovanni Takes A&T 'By Storm'

GREENSBORO -- She's Nikki Giovanni, the self-styled "princess of black poetry," but in person, she's more than that.

She's a free thinking but dynamic 29-year-old revolutionary who took the A&T University by storm recently.

Nikki, the author of several best selling books of poetry, is not the small quiet woman she resembles before she opens her mouth to speak.

She's got strong opinions, oftimes spiced with expletives on a lot of things.

Like Wilt Chamberlain -- She takes him apart for his famous statement charging that black women to him are inadequate.

"I resent that..." said Nikki. "Why, I don't even like men who are seven-foot tall. If black women seem

inadequate, it's because we have declared our undying love for black men."

She also deplores any notion that one of the black man's handicaps has been the lack of strong family ties.

What Moynihan (Patrick Moynihan) says is simply not true," said Nikki. Even during slavery and during other hard times, everyone worked towards the betterment of the family, and contrary to some opinion, we have always had strong black men."

"We have somewhat of a problem with the young black men," she said. "I'm just not excited about those who are coming along now."

Nikki, who wrote a collection of poems, "Spin a Soft Black Song," especially for her son, Tommy, travels everywhere with him. She hopes eventually to take him to Africa because she wants him to understand his heritage -- something she said she did not know about when she was a child, growing up in Cincinnati.

"In the old days, the old people took a wife and that was it for life and the family unit was pretty strong," she added. "Some of the
