FAYETTEVILLE - Coach Raymond McDougal, after suffering a 4-7 '74 season, will have a nucleus of outstanding players returning at Fayetteville State University when the whistle blows for the '75 home football opener against Norfolk State College, September 20.

Leading returnees for the FSU Bronco gridmen is All-CIAA James Godwin, the leading ground gainer for the team with 1079 yards. Other outstanding players returning include Charles Boyd, Reginald Broadnax, Wayne Bythwood, Ronald Crawford,

James Gaddy, Tim Heath, Dave Jones, Tony Reid, James Saunder, Jackie Simmons, and Armond Wren.

Coach McDougal has total of 21 letterman returning while losing only 15 last year.

Gone are All-CIAA linesmen Sylvester Ritter and John Young, both free agents signed by the Houston Oilers and Dallas Cowboys respectively.

McDougal, entering his fifth season as the head Bronco, has a collegiate record of 25 wins and 24 losses with one tie.

Bob McAdoo Voted NBA's Most Valuable Player

NEW YORK—Bob McAdoo, who was the runnerup to Kareem Abdul-Jabbar a year ago in Podoloff Trophy voting, is now No. 1 among National Basketball Association players for 1974-75. Moreover, the Most Valuable Player vote announced Wednesday by Commissioner Walter Kennedy wasn't even close.

"I'm really happy. I can't believe it. It seems like a dream," the 6-10 center of the Buffalo Braves exclaimed upon hearing the news.

In the 20th annual polling of NBA players, Bob received 51 first place votes, 38 seconds and 28 thirds for 547 points on the basis of a 5-3-1 point scale.

Boston's Dave Cowens, the MVP two seasons ago, finished second. The Celtics' center who missed the first 17 games of the season with a broken bone in his foot polled 32 firsts, 42 seconds and 24 thirds for 310 points.

Washington's Elvin Hayes, who never before finished higher than fifth in Podoloff

Trophy voting, came in a strong third with 289 points. Golden State's Rick Barry, No. 2 to McAdoo in scoring average and the league leader in foul shooting and steals, wound up fourth with 254 points and Abdul-Jabbar finished fifth with 161 points.

NBA players were asked to vote for a first, second and third choice for MVP with the only restriction being not to vote for players on their own team. A total of 193 players voted.

McAdoo, zeering in on his second straight scoring average championship, has helped Buffalo clinch a playoff spot for the second straight year. Last season the Braves finished 42-40 and were 48-30 with four games left as of March 31.

McAdoo added on being named MVP, "I'm really lucky I started out on a young team instead of those with veterans. I'd still be a bench warmer."

There are many, many NBA observers who would doubt that.
