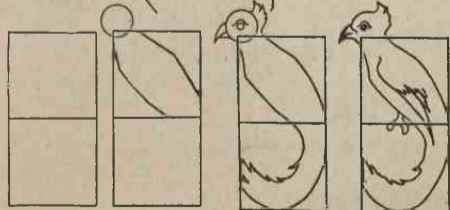

Ralph Brown, a Southern Guilford High product, and Charles Bell, from Northeast High, will be in the starting defensive backfield. Willie Jones, of Northeast, and Lewis Alston, of Southern Guilford, will be the starting linebackers.

Hornsey Howell, Jr., the coach's son and a product of Dudley High, will handle the punting. Other players on the 1975 roster include Rachon Fuller, a defensive end from Page High who was named the MVP in the 1974 Shrine Bowl game; Onsure Wray Stokes, a flanker from Page High; Rod Westmoreland, a quarterback from Dudley; Oscar Lowe, a defensive end from Page; Mike Caldwell, a defensive back from Southeast Guilford; and Fred Marshall, a linebacker from Page High.

The caliber of the talent on the Aggie roster is in strong contrast to the belief that it is difficult for a local school to get their area.

"Sure a lot of players want to go away from home when they consider a college," Howell said. "However, I believe that if a coach can show a prospect a good overall program, indicating the number of football players who graduate by the end of their playing career and the courses of study, the chances of the athlete signing are great."

The Aggies open their 1975 season on Saturday, September 6, against CIAA rival, Virginia Union. The last time the two teams met was in 1958 at which time the Aggies won 40-6.

"We certainly will have to be ready when we play them this season because they return 24 of their top players from the 1974 team which finished with a 10-2 record," Howell said.
