#### THE NAPKIN.

### Negroes Launch Drive

WELDON. — Eighteen community meetings were held by the county Negro extension workers during the week for the purpose of launching the Victory garden campaign for the 2,286 Negro farm operators in Halifax county. Representatives from 50 communities, aggregating over 700 interested farmers, were present at these meetings and from this number 236 group leaders were appointed to lead groups of 15 families with farm women serving as assistants.

### MARRIAGE QUESTION OPENS LEGAL DEBATE

A lot of inquiries reach offices in the county courthouse, but one that the postman brought today from an army officer at an air corps training center in Georgia was definitely in a class by itself. Indeed, it was so knotty that it was forwarded to the state attorney general for his opinion.

The army officer wanted to know if North Carolina recognizes "marriage by proxy," and-horseback opinion of officials was in the negative. There were a lot of details that bothered the officials' minds, even without trying to give an answer.

According to the inquiry, it appeared that a young American and a 24-year-old young woman in Montevideo, Uruguay, want to be married, but there are the barriers of distance and the immigration and passport laws. However, officials were of the opinion that the writer was wrong in assuming that the South American could not obtain permission to enter this country.

Anyway, it seems that the intended bridegroom cannot go to South America for his bride, and the only solution that presented itself to the young couple apparently was the possibility of marriage by proxy.

Consensus at the courthouse was that a person may do lots of things by proxy but one of these is not getting married.

### PRECAUTION.
