Added attractions will feature Prof. Charles G. Greene, director of Dramatics at A. and T. college; Cpl. C. A. Roberts, NBC and CBS Radio Artist, New York; Miss Hazel Leon Bridges, Mezzo-Soprano, Julliard School of Music, New York City; Mrs. Vivian F. Hayes, soprano, Greensboro; Cpl. Merritt Hedgeman, Town Hall; five choirs and choruses—The Silver Trumpet Gospel Choir; Interdenominational Ushers' Choruses, Elks, the Community Chorus, and Russell's Harmonizers, Winston-Salem, will also appear.

There will be a mammoth street parade at 2:00 p.m., preceding the program, and kiddies party and doll parade, Saturday, May 20, at 10 p.m., the kids will be entertained at the Palace theater, and refreshments at the Windsor Community Center free.

The Doll Parade will be held in Memorial Stadium, Sunday, May 21, 1944. Prizes will be awarded. The Queen of Song Festival will be crowned Sunday, May 21, also.

College, with the report of committees, chief among these being the program of work, adopting a new constitution and nominating committees. Fifteen members of the association were nominated for the Modern Farmer Degree, the highest degree conferred by state associations. Albert Sprull of Tyrrell county was elected the most outstanding member for the year. McCoy Harris of Oxford was nominated to be the state's candidate for the H. O. Sargent award at the national convention. Alonzo White of Clarkton was nominated for the Superior Degree. Theophilus Manley of the Eastman School, Enfield, won in the Public Speaking contest. Herbert Love, retiring president, presided over the meeting.

## OBITUARY, PHOEBE HARRINGTON CALDWELL

Phoebe Harrington Caldwell was born in Marlboro county, South Carolina, on a day in November, 77 years ago. Her parents, Michael Harrington and Mary Harrington, were of the sturdy, upstanding and outstanding Christian stock that loved and feared God, and served Him against all odds. Her father was a local elder in the South Carolina conference, and his parchments bear the signature of that mighty champion of humanity—Matthew W. Simpson. The deceased was next to the youngest of five daughters and one son, all five of whom preceded her by many years to the great beyond.

The deceased attended what public schools and received such training as was available to her in her girlhood. Colleges were few, and her parents were poor, and though there was always the intense desire to have attended some school of advanced training, that door of hope never opened to her. What knowledge she had, and the wonderful store of wisdom growing out of her knowledge and experience was gained—"line upon line, precept upon precept, here a little and there a little"—with a mind and heart ever alert to drink in, and appropriate such information as

was being dispensed from every source.

As a girl, she was interested in the Church and Christianity, and early in her life, while yet in her teens, she was led by the tender though firm hand of her father to the mercy seat, and through his and her prayers she was accepted by her heavenly Father as a forgiven and saved child. She worked in the Sunday school and church of her community and became even in her young girlhood a devout, Christian leader.

She was a member of St. Matthews church for 50 years and as Sunday school student, class leader, member of the Woman's Home Missionary Society, and at times staunch worker in the WCTU (and more recently in WCSU) she saw the coming and going of the pastors of St. Matthews church from the days of Rev. Pazzavia O'Connell, down through the years. She is credited with taking some small part in the successes and triumphs of her church through these years. There are more persons than the devoted members of her family who will attest to her usefulness and to her sterling quality of character in the various areas of responsibilities where she served.

She was a lover of education, and had a keen appreciation for persons who bore the stamp of an educational institution.

Her children, take delight in testifying to the thousand sacrifices she made, and the life's blood she gave that those of her own household might bear the marks of preparation for service.

She departed this life Tuesday, April 18.

She leaves to pick up her cross of idealism which she let fall from her worn and weakened fingers, a husband, John Edward Caldwell; three sons, Rev.
