The Shelby District Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church South is in session here with Presiding Elder Rev. J. R. Scroggs of Shelby in charge.

Delegates began pouring into the town Tuesday afternoon and every train through yesterday brought others besides the large numbers coming by private conveyances until today the town is of a truth in the hands of the Methodists.

The Shelby District comprises Cleveland, Gaston and Lincoln Counties and a part of Catawba County representing twenty one pastoral charges and some seventy five or eighty churches.

The conference work began Tuesday night with a missionary sermon by Rev. Frank Siler, the Missionary Secretary of the Western North Carolina Conference with headquarters at Waynesville, N. C. This feature was not purely a part of the conference program but coming as it did in direct connection with the conference work was presided over by Presiding Elder, Dr. Scroggs.
