Whitewash Valuable To Peach Growers

Spraying peach trees with whitewash to reduce their response to the sun's heat during mild winter weather may protect them from cold

To avoid winter injury the trees are insulated from heat and not which her niece, Mrs. DeWitt Ware from cold, explains C. F. Williams, research horticulturist of the State College Experiment Station.

It is impossible to protect the or chard from the cold, but some de especially the sun's rays, can be given. This is the purpose of the whitewash coating.
