## Students Rain Pennies On Stores to Protest Against Hidden Taxes

Troy, N. Y., May 2.—(I.P.S.)—Boston is remembered in history for its tea party. Perhaps Troy, N. Y., may make its mark because of the "great penny rebellion of 1938."  
For several days recently pennies were as scarce in the city as old fashioned Spanish doubloons. Shopkeepers had no coppers with which to make change; banks reported their supply exhausted and franticly appealed to out-of-town banks to rush an emergency supply.  
The reason: The 1,400 students at Central Polytechnic Institute had cornered the copper coins for a unique protest campaign against hidden taxes. With 250,000 pennies and a slogan "We'll Put The Axe To Hidden Tax With The Accent on the 'ent'", the student body finally went to work putting the pennies back in circulation. They paid 25 per cent of every purchase in pennies. They called their group the "Tax-CENT-nials."

Robert Baumann, president of one of the student groups at the school, was the author of the plan and had the support of the Institute's President, Dr. William O. Hotchkiss. Baumann said a study by his group had shown that 25 per cent of every \$1 spent was to pay taxes hidden in the price of the article. That was why the students decided to protest, he said.  
Dr. Hotchkiss, in placing his official stamp of approval on the novel campaign, declared: "I am extremely sympathetic with the purpose of the affair. I think it is a laudable purpose for the students to be tax conscious. And I think that this affair will get other people tax conscious."

Result: Trading in all business establishments was slowed materially while clerks and cashiers counted pennies; the merchants were peeved at hidden taxes because it necessitated a lot of extra work. The customers were peeved at hidden taxes because they had to wait longer in the stores while the clerks were busy counting somebody else's pennies. Yes, everybody became sorely conscious of hidden taxes.

Washington, May 2.—The National Association of Manufacturers said tonight there was a "crumb of encouragement" in the Labor Relations board's decision to revoke its Ford and Republic Steel findings pending further procedure.  
This, the industrial association said in a statement, will have a "salutary effect on business" but still fails to reach into the fundamental issues.

## Business Is Encouraged By NLRB Action On Ford

Amendment of the Wagner labor disputes act, and marked improvement in its administration by the labor board still were necessary, the association said.  
The board decided to revoke the Ford and Republic findings after the Supreme Court declared that both sides in a case before a government agency should be given the opportunity to challenge the facts as finally set forth by the government agent.  
In neither the Ford nor the Republic case was the employer given such opportunity. Each was found guilty of violating the Wagner act.

## Farm Women Taught to Make Mattresses

Hundreds of homemade cotton mattresses, produced at a cost of only a few dollars, are supplying added comfort in farm homes throughout North Carolina.  
Miss Pauline Gordon, extension home management and house furnishings specialist at State College, has been stressing mattress-making as an important part of home demonstration club work.  
Many counties, particularly those in southwestern Carolina, have used mattresses as one of their projects.  
"Besides adding comfort to the home," Miss Gordon said, "some of the surplus cotton is taken care of in the manufacture of these mattresses."  
Miss Gordon pointed out that the ticking, thread, and buttons required can be purchased for as little as two dollars. If the woman owns her cotton, then materials will be her only cost.  
Between 45 and 50 pounds of cotton are required in making mattress. At nine cents a pound, this would amount to approximately four dollars. Adding two \$2.00 for the materials, the total cost in the average case would not be more than \$6.00.  
Several women working together can make a complete mattress in a few hours. By using such an arrangement, many families in a community can get new mattresses made easily and cheaply.  
Home agents in this State have lesson sheets available which contain full directions for making mattresses at home.
