Farm Questions  
Answered

Q.—Is it necessary to feed grain to beef calves?

A.—Yes. Grain feeding will bring in a much greater profit as a young calf will put on 100 pounds gain with only two-thirds as much feed as an animal of similar grade that is a year or two older. Calves fed a supplementary ration will reach a good market weight in from 10 to 14 months which mean a quicker turn over in capital. This supplementary feeding makes it easier on the cows and allows for rebreeding at the desired time. Two parts of shelled corn and one part of oats should be fed the calf at two to three months of age. From that time on the corn should be increased from 8 to 10 parts to one part of cottonseed meal.

Q.—How can I control potato beetles in my home garden?

A.—An application of calcium arsenate should be made as soon as the beetles appear in any number and continued as often as the beetles become numerous. This poison may be used either as a dust or spray, but the plants should be thoroughly covered for best results. For dusting, the material should be used without dilution. A small hand duster has given excellent results. When used as a spray use ten teaspoonful of calcium arsenate to three gallons of water for small gardens and two pounds of the poison to 50 gallons of water for large amounts.

Q.—When should grain be given baby chicks?

A.—Chicks should be given grain feed after the first eight or ten days. This should be fed two or three times a day in the mash hoppers and on top of the mash. This lessens the chance of the chick picking up droppings. It is very essential that sufficient hopper space be supplied so that all the birds can eat at one time. Where it is necessary to keep the chicks in the brooder house, the ration should be supplemented with one per cent of biologically tested cod liver oil. However, if the birds have access to a range and direct sunlight this supplement is unnecessary.

H. G. Dozier, of Moyock, Currituck County, has grazed 92 hogs on 6.4 acres of spring pasture seeded last fall to a mixture of vetch, wheat and oats. He says, as a result, the rise meal consumption was cut by 60 per cent and corn consumption by one-fourth.

Chick Coccidiosis Nears  
Worst Stage

Chick coccidiosis, striking at poultry flocks over the State, is expected to reach its worst stage in the next two or three weeks, according to H. C. Gauger, State College poultry specialist.

The disease does its greatest damage among birds four to 12 weeks old, although older birds may be infected if they eat enough eggs of the coccidiosis parasite.

The parasite causing this disease is so small that it cannot be seen without the aid of a microscope, but the disease can be detected by the bloody droppings and pale appearance of the birds.

Where the outbreak is severe, the young birds die rapidly.

The most effective mean for con-

trolling coccidiosis is rigid sanitation.

Chicks that seem to be sick or are undersized should be killed and buried or buried deeply. This will remove chicks that are either infected or likely to become infected, and which would make culls if left to grow into adult birds.

Removing infected chicks decreases the number of parasite eggs that will be discharged into the brooder house and the chick runs.

The litter and sand should be cleaned-out of the brooder house at least every other day. Replace it with clean sand or gravel to a depth of 1.5 of an inch. The waste that has been removed be buried or placed where the birds can't get to it.

Ordinary disinfectants don't help much in controlling chick coccidiosis, but it is good to clean the feed and water containers every few days with boiling water.
