For almost three months last winter Cleveland County, never knew what night they might be awakened by the crackle of flames and the screams of tortured animals. Two gangs of incendiaries masked their wholesale bootlegging activities with the threat of smoke, attempting to terrorize neighbors into covering their law-breaking. The chapter is ended, we believe. Judge Don Phillips has apparently written finish with his heavy sentence on six men found guilty of the low and cunning crime of barn burning.

But the blows that really ended this scourge were struck by Raymond Cline, high sheriff of Cleveland, in one of the finest pieces of rural detection we know of, in a campaign that required patience, courage, and determination. The single-handed feat has been applauded by the judge and by the solicitor, and to their plaudits we wish to let our congratulations echo.

And we believe, sheriff, that the entire county is taking off its hat to you this week.

Highest praise for Sheriff Raymond Cline, endurance and courage. "I can hardly recall an instance in which an officer of the law has performed more zealously or efficiently than Sheriff Cline. In the Swink, Canipe and York cases he was thorough, efficient and fast. In the Vic Lee case, which involved the county's most notorious wholesale bootlegger and his negro henchmen, the Sheriff labored late at night and was able by his perseverance to present a clear-cut case against the murderers. "Like Chicago Gange" "I believe his steady hand and good brain have broken up the two biggest crime rings in the county — crime rings comparable in their viciousness to those of Chicago gangsters.
