

Well Made Dress Is Better In Long Run

A good quality dress fits neatly and keeps its shape, said Willie N. Hunter, extension clothing specialist at State College, in pointing out things to consider in buying clothes. It's better to pay a little more and get a dress that will last than to try to save a little extra by getting the cheapest dress that can be found. Look at the center front, back of dress at the neck, and the cap of the sleeves to see that these lines are on the lengthwise thread rather than crosswise. Be sure that the material has been preshrunk. If not, the first cleaning may result in ripped armholes and neck.

Take time to look at the seams, inside as well as outside. The seams in a good dress are wide and finished so they will not pull out or fray. However, closely woven clothes such as cotton broadcloth does not fray so easily as the more loosely woven fabrics, and the seams do

not have to be as deep to hold firmly. Children's clothes should be considered as carefully as those for adults. Garments should be full and roomy. Children are active, do a lot of reaching and stretching, and many of them grow rapidly. Children's clothes should be colorful and attractive, durable, comfortable, and healthful. Miss Hunter pointed out.

Cows On Pasture May Need Grain Fed Too

When cows are turned on good pasture in the spring and early summer, the amount of grain fed in their ration can be reduced, said John A. Arey, extension dairy specialist at State College.

Grazing on lush grasses, a cow can obtain enough nutrients with the roughage to sustain her body weight and produce a certain quantity of milk.

A Holstein cow can eat enough grass to maintain body weight and produce about 30 pounds of milk a day—a Jersey cow 20 pounds. But when producing more milk, the cows should receive enough grain to compensate for the extra milk given.

A Holstein on good pasture needs about 25 of a pound of grain for each pound of milk she produces daily above 30 pounds.

A Jersey on good pasture, because her milk is richer in butter fat, will need about 35 of a pound of grain for each pound of milk she produces above 20 pounds a day.

These figures were arrived at by research workers who conducted feeding experiments at the U. S. Department of Agriculture's experiment farm at Beltsville, Maryland.

But Arey warned that the cows will need more grain when pasture is short as a result of dry weather early in the season, or when the pasture grasses become more mature in July and August.

As the grass gets older, the amount of crude fiber is increased while the amount of nutrients decreases. On the other hand, grass that is just getting started early in the year is watery and low in feed value. The best grazing is secured between these two periods.

Farm Questions Answered

Q.—What is the effect of fertilization on pastures?

A.—An occasional application of lime, phosphate, and potash to the pasture will encourage the growth of the most desirable pasture plants such as white clover and blue grass. These plants prolong the grazing period by producing both early and late grazing. As they or other good pasture plants increase in number, the less desirable ones will be crowded out. Eventually this soil treatment will result in the production of an abundant succulent pasture growth which has a much higher mineral and protein content than is found in ordinary pasture plants.

Q.—When will Farm and Home Week be held this summer?

A.—This annual convention for farmers and farm women will take place at State College August 1-5. Extension Service officials are now making plans to produce a meeting that is both educational and entertaining. Tours of Raleigh, Duke University, and the University of North Carolina will be available to those attending. In addition, there will be motion pictures, group singing recreation, and other entertainment. Special classes in various farm and home projects will be taught by State College specialists.
