**PRaises LOCAL MECHANIC**

A columnist in a Gastonia Gazette of recent date, praises work of well-known local mechanic in the following:

REV. WILLIAM MOORE BOYCE, A. R. P. preacher from Kings Mountain, in town this morning, driving his Plymouth automobile which was stolen last winter by a couple of North Carolina escaped convicts. It figured in a fierce gun battle in Kings Mountain between officers and the bandits and when Mr. Boyce recovered it, he found five or six bullet holes through the body and top. This morning not a sign of the holes was visible, so perfect a job of re-conditioning had been done by Grady King, of Kings Mountain. The metal had been rolled out, the holes plugged with a filling of lead or zinc and the hole sanded and polished down until you could not tell where a hole was. Two or three of the bullets went through both sides of the car. The bandits, one of whom was Lester Haney, and who were later recaptured, told him when he visited them in jail, that they had driven the car at times 90 miles an hour. . . . but it is all right today.


