Census report shows that 5,990 bales of cotton were ginned in Cleveland County, N. C. from the crop of 1938 prior to October 1, as compared with 20,396 bales for the crop of 1937.

Soy Beans Make Good Grazing For Cattle

Soybeans will grow well in sandy soils and provide late summer grazing for dairy cattle in Eastern North Carolina, said A. C. Kimrey, extension dairy specialist at State College in telling of a demonstration conducted in Dare County this summer.

Mrs. R. Bruce Etheridge, of Manteo, and B. A. Williams, of Wanchese, conducted the experiment by growing the soybeans in narrow rows, and having several fields for the cows to graze in rotation.

Williams planted two fields of about three acres each, and let the cows graze in one and then the other. He would leave them in one field until they had most of the leaves off, but not long enough for them to graze too close to the stalks.

Then while the cows were shifted to the other field, the first field would grow out another crop of foliage. By thus alternating the fields, Williams got three grazings off each and cut his feed bill in half. The production, he told County Agent C. W. Overman.

Mrs. Etheridge had several acres which were treated in the same manner, and she too got an increase in milk production while cutting her feed costs. She also plans to provide plenty of grazing for her herd

this fall and winter by seeding approximately 10 acres to vetch and small grain.

Kimrey said he is especially pleased with the results of the experiment, for one of the problems confronting Eastern Carolina farmers is providing adequate good grazing.

Fast Process Advance Predicted For Future

Washington, Oct. 12.—(IPS).—Although industrial research in the past 25 years has accelerated the advance of our standard of living beyond all other periods, an even faster rate of progress lies in the future, according to M. H. Smith, electrical engineering specialist, in a recent speech here.

Mr. Smith said that "probably one fourth of our present production is of products entirely unknown fifty

years ago. Without the protection afforded by the patent system, capital could not afford to venture into new fields."

Research, he said, was one of the most effective means of protecting capital invested in industry from the "decay of obsolescence." He cited a recent investigation by the investment divisions of several large insurance companies which showed that, from an actuarial standpoint, the companies which "died" invariably did little or nor research.
