**Brief News Items**

Hog shipments by small cooperating groups of farmers in eastern North Carolina have been started for the fall season. The Beaufort-Hyde group sold 136 last week for \$2,355.53. Extension specialists predict increased popularity of this kind of selling this year.

Cottonseed has started sprouting in the boll according to reports from Lenoir and Wilson counties. The lint also was damaged by recent heavy rains.

Hog pastures not rotated are but breeding places for parasites and diseases, say Halifax farmers who are adopting improved sanitary measures for growing their animals.

When W. A. Brown of Concord, route 1, started to house his lespedeza hay this fall, he had to remove 73 tons of old hay out of his barns to make space for the new.

The Pender swine growers shipped 170 hogs through their small co-op association last week and received \$2,447.11 for the lot.

J. S. Eakes of Sampson County wanted to plant some pines on a cut over area on his farm but when he and the county agent studied the situation, they found it best to let the land renew the natural growth of hardwoods.

**Experiment Station Asks More Money**

An increasing demand for research work will prompt the North Carolina Experiment Station to ask the General Assembly for an increase of \$82,735 yearly for the next biennium, said Dr. I. O. Schaub of State College, acting director of the Station.

At the present time, the income of the Experiment Station from State sources amounts to \$45,600. Dr. Schaub explained that \$5,000 comes from the general fund for special apple research, \$26,350 from the agricultural fund, and \$14,200 from miscellaneous receipts.

If the increase is granted, it will provide the necessary offset to meet the \$128,285 in Federal funds authorized under the Bankhead-Jones Act.

The request calls for an additional \$3,000 for apple research so that the work might be spread more evenly over the State and take care of problems other than diseases. Each research would be appropriate to a disease control, fertilization, soil building, and other problems in connection with the production and marketing of this fruit.

The 1937 General Assembly provided for a penny fund and other appropriate funds for necessary research and the employment of workers. It is proposed to allocate \$10,000 for special peanut research.

Fruits and flowers, because of their increasing importance, would be allowed \$16,000. Leaf cattle and sheep would be appropriated \$15,000 for research work, especially in the mountain territory.

Inadequate research with vegetables would be remedied to a certain extent by the \$12,000 appropriation asked for. Soil testing work would get \$15,000.

**Public Vague On Tax Levies, Says Experts**

New York, Oct. 12.—(IPS).—The effect of hidden taxes upon the every day life of America was emphasized here recently by Walter M. Franklin, Secretary of the Citizen's Public Expenditure Survey, in making public a current study of the taxation problem.

"Most people have only a vague conception of the amount of taxes they pay," Mr. Franklin said. "Certain of our taxes are so expertly hidden that we hardly know we are paying them," he added. "Property taxes, income taxes and gasoline taxes are readily recognized. . . . Few people know that rents could be reduced one-third if it were not for taxes, or that the cost of everything they buy is increased because of taxes."
