Gaston, Lincoln Lutherans Meet

Special Service To Be Held At School Building In Cherryville. Dr. Brown To Speak.

A Union Reformation liturgical service in which all the Lutheran churches of Gaston, Cleveland and Lincoln counties will take part will be held Sunday, October 30, at 7:30 p. m. in the high school auditorium at Cherryville. All denominations of the town will take part in the service, to which the public is invited.

The observance of Reformation Day celebrates the nailing of the 95 Theses on the church door at Wittenburg by Dr. Martin Luther on October 31, 1517, four hundred and twenty-one years ago, marking the beginning of the movement for Protestantism.

Dr. P. D. Brown, pastor of Ebenezer Lutheran church of Columbia, S. C., one of the largest Lutheran churches in the South, will preach the sermon. Dr. Brown is one of the outstanding ministers of the United Lutheran church in America. He was formerly president of the South Carolina Lutheran Synod, and is now serving on many important boards of the Lutheran church in America.

The Cherryville Lutheran choir, assisted by the other church choirs in the community, will render a special program of sacred songs. Rev. W. G. Cobb, president of the Southern Lutheran conference, and pastor of the Cherryville church will have charge of the service.

A full liturgical service, including improvised altar and a vested choir will be used. The Lutheran ministers of the various churches of the two counties will wear robes.

The speakers on this notable occasion will be introduced by Rev. L. Boyd Harlan, pastor of the Lutheran church at Kings Mountain.

People of Kings Mountain are still taking advantage of the facilities offered by the Public Library. During the last quarter, ending October 1st, a total of 5,859 books were read, this is an average of about 75 books per day, during the four hours the Library is open.

During the same period 4,477 adults and 2,176 young folks visited the Library.

According to a report from the State Library Commission of Raleigh, the Kings Mountain Public Library is 19th in the per capita circulation of the 121 libraries in North Carolina. During the year a total of 29,296 books were read, this number divided by the population of Kings Mountain gives a per capita circulation of 5.2.

The Kings Mountain Public Library is free to everyone, and citizens are invited to use the facilities offered.
