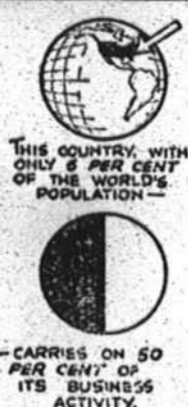

NOTICE OF A NEW REGISTRATION, THE ESTABLISHMENT OF VOTING PLACES AND THE CALL FOR TOWN ELECTION ON TUESDAY, MAY 2, 1939

The Mayor and Board of Commissioners for the Town of Kings Mountain at their regular meeting on March 6, 1939, established the voting places for the Town Election to be held on Tuesday, May 2, 1939, as follows:

The voting place for Ward No. 1 shall be in the City Hall.
The voting place for Ward No. 2 shall be in the City Hall.

The voting place for Ward No. 3 shall be in the Phenix Mill Store.
The voting place for Ward No. 4 shall be in the Kings Mountain Manufacturing Company's Store.

The voting place for Ward No. 5 shall be at the Cleveland Motor Company.

In compliance with the new amendment to the Charter, the Board ordered that a new registration be held in each ward and only those who register shall be permitted to vote in the coming elections, the registration books for the new registration shall be open at the aforesaid voting places on Saturday, April 1, 1939, and for three successive Saturdays thereafter, closing on Saturday April 22, 1939.

The Board appointed as registrar for Ward No. 1, D. H. Houser, and judges, W. A. Ridenhour and Ed Patterson; for Ward No. 2, Registrar, S. A. Croise, Judges L. Arnold Kiser and T. N. Harmon; for Ward No. 3, registrar, Boyd Putnam, Judges D. C. Paysour and Haskel Wilson; for Ward No. 4, registrar, W. F. England, Judges, Ross Roberts and W. K. White; for Ward No. 5, registrar, Pride Ratterree, Judges, I. B. Goforth and George Mauney.

The polls will be opened from seven A. M. until six P. M. on Tuesday

May 2, 1939 at the places designated above for the election of one Commissioner for the Town of Kings Mountain in each of said five wards and for the election of one trustee in each of said wards for the Kings Mountain Graded School Districts. The trustee for Ward No. 1 shall be elected for a period of two years, the trustee for Ward No. 2 shall be elected for a period of four years, the trustee for Ward No. 3 shall be elected for a period of four years, the trustee for Ward No. 4 shall be elected for a period of six years and the trustee for Ward No. 5 shall be elected for a period of six years. That part of the territory of the Kings Mountain Graded School District outside of the corporate limits and on the East side of the Southern Railway shall vote in Ward No. 3 for a school trustee and that part of the territory in the Kings Mountain Graded School District and outside of the corporate limits on the West side of the Southern Railway shall vote for a school trustee in Ward No. 4.

Notice is further given that any person desiring to run as Town Commissioner or School Trustee shall at least five days before the election file his or her announcement in writing with the City Clerk.

It is further ordered that this notice be run in the Kings Mountain Herald for four weeks beginning on the 9th of March, 1939, and a copy be placed in each of the five wards.
