On fie more fertile soils, a complete fertilizer will not be needed be cause the object there is to stimul ate the growth of legume plants. such as the clovers and lespedeza. All that is needed for this purpose is in application of phosphate and Murray, Beulah Rhea\*, Jean McClain lime, such as ground limestone and superphosphere or basic slag.

One to two thousand pounds ground limestone and about 300 lbs. of superphosphate, 400 to 500 pounds of basic slag per acre will do the work. 
