Baptist Church were the following family names: Hoke, Carpenter, Homesley ., Littlejohn, Baumgardner, Long Reynolds Kendrick; Cob Felmet, Poteat, Morrison and Dickey The present Church was organiz ed sometime in the year 1890 with about thirty members, according to much in evidence The gorge- Heard some of them before from the best information available. from Old Bethlehem Church three records have been lost three preachers were responsible for the leader ship of the first years, Rev. M. P. Matheny, |Rev. J. E. McManaway. and Dr. F. C Hickson.

The State Board helped this little band of noble Baptist make their heginning. Forty dollars a year was allotted them this being two fifths f' the pastor's salary.

Mrs. J. R. Reynolds and Mrs. Sylvanus Mauney are the only surviv-ing members of that first faithful group of Baptists.

The first house was built of wood and located upon the lot of the pres ent church site. Space does not per mit the relating of the story of prayer, faith and loyalty of those early Cays.

Great people inspire great preaching and this Church is no excepticn. In the life of the Churh many cutstanding names appear on the coll call of the preachers of the past. Anthors, scholars and missionaries, Men of devotion and stability have served as pastors of the Church. By 1901 membership had rea ched the number of 197 and marked the beginning of a preaching vice every Sunday.

By 1914 the church roll had climbed to 406.

The present Church building was erected in 1913 and the first WOP ship in the new auditorium was con cluded with the ordinance of bap-tism. Miss Ruth Baumgardner and her neice, Ruth Baker were the candidates.

Baptists have always placed emphasis upon the teaching of the Bibe. From the very first days the Sun day School has shown remarkable advancement both in numbers and in the quality of teaching. Along with the growth of the Church the W. M| U. and its Auxiliaries have occupied a large place in giving mis sionary inspiration and vision.--Con tributed .



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
