Home Building And Loan Association

On the 23rd day of March, 1923, a group made up of some of the representative citizens of Kings Mountain met in the Pythian Club room and as a result of this meeting, an organization known as the Home Building and Loan was perfected.

The late H. T. Fulton was elected temporary chairman and A. H. Patterson, temporary secretary. Temporary directors were also elected as follows: J. E. Anthony, O. G. Falls, G. D. Hambricht, A. H. Patterson, J. B. Thomasson, H. T. Fulton, M. L. Rogers, M. E. Herndon, J. O. Plonk, W. G. Hughes and W. S. Dilling.

The first meeting after organization was held on April 12th and the above mentioned directors with the addition of E. A. Smith, Jr., were elected. A. H. Patterson was elected secretary and treasurer and has served for the entire 16 years. Dr. O. G. Falls was elected president and J. B. Thomasson, vice president. Dr. Falls headed the organization for seven years or until his death in 1930. Dr. Falls gave freely of his time and much credit is due him for the success of the organization. Dr. J. E. Anthony was elected pres-

ident to succeed Dr. Falls and has served in this capacity for the past nine years.

Mr. E. L. Campbell was elected attorney for the organization.

Of the first board of directors, four, Dr. O. G. Falls, H. T. Fulton, W. S. Dilling and G. D. Hambricht have passed away.

Other citizens who served on the board of directors at various times are I. B. Goforth, I. Grady Patterson, M. L. Harmon, N. F. McGill, J. O. Plonk, J. E. Mauney, C. F. Thomasson, E. W. Griffin, E. W. Gillespie, J. B. Thomasson, W. T. Bradford, T. N. Harmon, W. A. Ware, W. F. Ogata, J. B. Mauney, Z. F. Cranford, G. A. Bridges and L. L. Alexander.

The present officers and directors are J. E. Anthony, president; J. B. Thomasson, vice president; A. H. Patterson, secretary and treasurer; N. Harmon, Z. F. Cranford, L. L. Alexander, G. A. Bridges; I. G. Patterson and J. B. Mauney. Attorneys are E. L. Campbell, J. R. Davis and E. A. Harrill.

The Association owns the building corner Mountain and Cherokee street. This building provides adequate space for the office of the Association and in addition to this houses Wright's Earber Shop on the first floor. On the second floor are found office rooms occupied by Attorneys E. L. Campbell and E. A. Harrill.

The annual report of the treasurer

as given at the annual meeting of the stockholders in February showed substantial gains over the comparable year. The total assets for the coming year. The total assets on March 1st were \$348,120.44.

Since its organization the Home Building and Loan Association has been an important factor in the progress of this community. It has offered a channel of safe investment, safety and soundness established by sixteen years of service. Dividends have been paid promptly and all obligations met. Thrift has been encouraged and a plan of systematic saving has been followed by many of our homes, some humble, some more pretentious have been financed successfully. It has been the policy of the association to emphasize the soundest and most economical plan of home financing. Careful appraisals and conservative loans are made to the end that the best interest of all concerned are served.

Former President Wilson's idea of Thrift was expressed as follows: "If a man does not provide for his children; if he does not provide for

all who are dependent upon him as best he can — and if he has not vision of conditions to come, and that care for the days that have not yet come, which we sum up in the whole idea of Thrift and Savings, then he has not opened his eyes to any adequate conception of human life. We are in this world, not to provide for ourselves alone, but for others, and that is the basis of economy and everything which ministers to thrift and economy, supply the foundation of national life."

The officers of the Home Building and Loan endeavor to carry on, so that they may be a cog, however small in the wheel which turns as a stimulant to Thrift and Home Ownership in our community and by so doing, have a part in supplying the foundation of the national life of which the illustrious Wilson spoke.

The success of this institution is attributed not alone to the fact that its officers and directors have been men of integrity and business ability but to the fact that they have had the confidence and co-operation of scores of shareholders, from the Best Town in The State and surrounding community.
