

Kings Mountain Represented In Tournament

Five representatives of Kings Mountain high school will attend the first annual North Carolina Speech and Debate Tournament for nine-month standard high schools to be held at Wake Forest college Friday and Saturday, April 7-8.

Mildred Williams and Howard Whittington, affirmative, and Martha McClean and Clara Plonk, negative, will comprise the debate team and argue the query: "Resolved, that the United States should form an alliance with Great Britain." Howard Whittington will do the extempore speaking for the school, and Betty Lee Neisler will give an oration entitled, "A Tarheel Views North Carolina." D. M. Bridges, principal, will accompany the squad to the tournament.

Twenty five nine-month high schools will send representatives to the tournament. Already entered are, Reidsville, Kannapolis, Shelby, Tarboro, Rocky Mount, Lee Edwards of Asheville, Central of Charlotte, High Point Senior, R. J. Reynolds of Winston-Salem, Broughton and Hugh Morson of Raleigh, Lexington, Durham, Kings Mountain, Homeles Kingston, Senior of Greensboro, Fayetteville, Lumberton, Wake Forest, Enfield, Hendersonville, Wilkesboro and Yadkinville.

The Wake Forest meet will mark the first time the extempore technique in debating has been used in North Carolina high school tournament. One of the main objectives of the tourney is to get away from the conventional "stilted and canned" speeches in debates. Speakers are to

be encouraged to meet the arguments of the opponents directly.

Actual debate conditions, wherein an affirmative and negative team will meet in separate class, will be maintained. Each team will be permitted to debate four times before any are eliminated, thereby allowing each school to engage in eight debates. Judging throughout the tournament will be done by expert critics judges who will give oral criticisms of the participants following each debate. The final debate will be broadcast over Station WPTF, Raleigh, on Saturday evening, April 8, from nine to ten o'clock. J. M. Broughton, Raleigh, attorney, will present a 20 inch silver loving cup to the winning team.

Besides debates, contests will be held in oratory and extempore speaking. Medals will be awarded winners in these events.

Peanuts Should Be Planted May 1 to 15

H. D. Morris, agronomist of the North Carolina Agricultural Experiment Station at State College, reminds farmers of North Carolina that the best planting dates for peanuts are from May 1 to 15. Earlier plantings often result in rotten seed because of cold, wet weather, and plantings later than May 15 generally yield less than plantings on recommended dates, he advises.

Peanuts rank third in cash crop value in North Carolina, led only by tobacco and cotton. This state is one of the largest peanut-producing areas, ranking second at present and producing approximately one fourth of the annual crop in money value.

Jumbo Runner and Virginia Bunch are the two most commonly grown varieties in the northeastern section of the State, where most of the commercial crop is produced. The Spanish variety is grown principally in the piedmont section for home consumption and hog grazing.

Agronomist Morris recommends that peanuts be planted on well drained, sandy, fine sandy, and very fine sandy loams and that liming is necessary if the soil is too strongly acid. However, he says that growers should hesitate in applying large quantities of lime, especially if tobacco is grown in rotation to the peanuts.
