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State And National News

Grant Falls, April 25.—Lloyd Will his Peague, 9 year old son of Rev. and Mrs. L. W. Peague, hanged himself accidentally yesterday in a woodshed at the home here. He had been playing in a swing in the woodshed, it was reported, and when his mother went to call him she found the body. It appeared that the rope became tangled about his neck.

Raleigh, April 25.—North Carolina strawberry growers have already received nearly \$500,000 for their 1939 crop, the State Department of Agriculture said today.

More than two-thirds of the crop remains to be marketed. At present prices, the growers will receive about \$2,000,000 for this year's crop.

Asheville, April 25.—The Highland Hospital here will become the therapeutic unit of the new department of psychiatry to be established at Duke University Medical School in Durham.

Gift of the hospital to the University was made by Dr. Robert S. Carroll, founder, owner and medical director of the hospital.

New York, April 25.—In a move to end night club brawling, Mayor LaGuardia has ordered the cabaret license of El Morocco, a leading rendezvous of New York City's cafe society revoked.

Sacramento, Calif., April 25.—Reported threats of the Workers' Alliance, A CIO WPA workers union, to picket homes of members of the State Assembly economy bloc, today brought a counter-threat of retaliatory action by the legislators.

Pullman, Wash., April 25.—A bed-rump with a punching bag was fatal to ten year old James Graham. The boy died last night of a broken neck but exactly how he received the injury was a mystery. He became entangled in the rope of the bag, which hung from pipes over his head.

San Francisco, April 25.—The man who carried "a message to Garcia" was 82 years old yesterday, but there was no birthday celebration because for the second consecutive year he was ill in a hospital. Colonel Andrew Summers Rowan,

U. S. A., retired, took a message from President McKinley to Cuban rebel leaders, telling them of the United States' intention to send troops to Cuba to fight the Spanish.

Union, S. C., April 25.—Douglas Harris, 25, was held in jail here today on a charge of fatally shooting Hoke S. Scales, 32, a farmer of the Adamsburg section.

Scales was shot Sunday morning at Harris' home, Sheriff James G. Faucett said, and died a few hours later in a hospital.

A coroner's jury returned a verdict last night naming Harris as the killer.
