Farmers Get AAA Data By 'Farm Plan'

E. Y. Floyd, AAA executive officer at State College, says farmers are being offered first-hand information about the application of the 1939 Trial-A program to their farms through what is known as the "farm plan." County AAA committeemen are meeting with each farmer to help him work out his "farm plan," which is an outline of the way the program works on the individual farm in 1939. Floyd points out, through this personal contact with the committeemen, the farmer who desires to participate this year will be able to obtain information as to the application of the program to his farm.

These "farm plan" conferences include a discussion of the soil depletion crop allotments for the farm, and the working out of a list of soil building practices which will enable the farmer to earn the maximum payment, the AAA officer said. The list of soil building practices includes those which are not routine farming practices.

The "farm plan" also contains information about rates of payments, rate of deductions, and credit which will be given for each soil building practice, Floyd explained.

"Any farm operator who does not have the opportunity to work out a "farm plan" with his committeeman within the next few weeks should contact the county farm agent's office or his local committeeman to obtain this service, Floyd advised. A copy of the "farm plan" will be given the farmer to help him carry out the program on his farm.
