The bride's pastor, Rev. Hubert Huggins, performed the rite ceremony. An artistic arrangement of palms formed a background for tall baskets of white roses. The floral decorations of the chancel were flanked on either side and in the center by seven branched candelabra set with cathedral tapers.

Prior to and during the exchange of vows a program of nuptial music was rendered by Mrs. Franklin Harry, Jr., of Grover, N. C. Mrs. Harry was gowned in a navy blue dress with touches of chartreuse. She wore a shoulder bouquet of tallman roses.
