

More Cotton Being Used In Dress Material

As Maine goes, so goes the nation may be a trustworthy straw in the wind, glibly speaking. But if you want to know what the women of this country will be wearing this summer, take a walk down Fifth Avenue in New York right now and see what the nation's pace-setters are showing. It is the first step in national distribution.

Let's begin at 59th Street and walk away from the World's Fair. Bergdorf Goodman, who held the first showing of new Paris styles in this country on March 2, were displaying an evening dress in black and white printed cotton lace with white cotton flowers over the shoulder.

and another in white organdie with yocke and skirt to the hip embroidered in cut-out work. The skirt was exceedingly full.

Around the corner at Henri Bendel was a formal dress of raspberry organdie, printed in graduated daisies. Full 6-inch daisies were cut out and appliqued around the neck. It was all topped off with a head dress of white organdie flowers.

Let's look in at Bonwit Teller's—a cotton bride with the caption "Marriage Made in Heaven," in heavenly Penny Dotted Cotton Net, and a whole flock of early New Amsterdam cotton prints by Greyhounds.

Saks Fifth Avenue was showing a very full skirted organdie gown appliqued with birdseye pique leaves and flowered cotton prints for little girls—cotton suits for little boys.

On past the Public Library to peer into Lord and Taylor's—seven windows full of smart cottons. Two windows were devoted to "Grace at the Awkward Age," a theme they also promoted in their newspaper advertising. Paper doll fashions with suspender dresses and dotted swiss blouses filled four more windows, two of them showing Lanz prints. And the gringly popular gingham had a window to itself.

All of B. Altman and Company's windows were devoted to cotton. Posters read "Cottons Come to Town." One window was black and jonquil-yellow—another to checked ginghams, muslin ruffled petticoats, cotton accessories—exquisite eyellet—embroidered muslins and or handies worn with long Irish lace gloves.

If New York's Fifth Avenue windows are any guide to style—and we know they are—National Cotton Week's observance, May 22-27, will be the occasion for assembling complete summer wardrobes on the basis of cotton's comfort and style.
