Soybeans Suitable As Feed For Lambs

Although soybeans will produce "soft pork" if fed to fattening hogs, they are a desirable feed for lambs and will not affect the quality of the carcass, reports Dr. John E. Foster, associate professor of the State College Animal Husbandry Department. "In fact," he said, "we have found in our experimental work on the State College farm that ewes and lambs gain faster on soybean pasture than on any other kind."

With soybean production up nearly 10 times what it was 10 years ago, both farmers and scientists are looking for new and profitable uses for this soil-improving crop.

We have fed up to three-fourths of a pound of soybeans per day to sheep with good results," Dr. Foster stated. Soybean meal is an excellent protein supplement for sheep, cattle, and even swine. It is the whole beans fed to hogs after they reach 75 to 100 pounds in weight that produces soft and oily pork which is undesirable.

Dr. Foster cited results of experiments conducted by the U. S. Department of Agriculture at the Agricultural Research Center, Beltsville, Md., to support the investigations of the State College Experiment Station.

Three lots of lambs were fed at Beltsville. One group received the usual ration of cracked corn, cottonseed meal, and alfalfa hay. The second lot received only cracked soybeans and alfalfa hay. The third lot received a ration of equal parts of cracked soybeans and cracked corn, with alfalfa hay.

Use Caution In Outings And Vacations

RALEIGH, June 27.—Dr. Carl V. Reynolds, State Health Officer for North Carolina, has issued the following statement, to which he has requested that wide publicity be given:

"In view of the extended business and official holiday leave which this year will be observed in connection with the Fourth of July, and because of hundreds of inquiries I have received from North Carolina and throughout the country, I feel it my official duty at this time to urge our people to refrain from planning themselves to go or to carry their children into sections where there is an unusual incidence of infantile paralysis.

"The purpose of this appeal is not to ask the people to shun any one section in preference to another, but to avoid unnecessary exposure by not going into a section where there is a known prevalence of infantile paralysis.

"I am sure that upon careful reflection anyone will realize that there are many resorts free from suspicion of infantile paralysis and that such resorts will be selected in preference to those that may be questionable from the standpoint of presence of this disease.

"In other words, why sell your birthright for a mess of pottage? At the same time, I am convinced that those who live in areas where the incidence of infantile paralysis is above normal are doing uninfected sections an injustice to go into them and it is hoped that, during this season, persons from such areas will not in order to shun danger at home, come to North Carolina resorts. Let it be remembered also that there are some who, although they do not develop infantile paralysis in its active stages, serve as carriers—as in the case of typhoid fever and diphtheria—and that these may communicate the disease in its virulent form to others; to those perhaps, who may become incapacitated for life, as the result."

"This is an appeal for the self-preservation of our people who are urged to stop, look and listen!"

Farm Questions

Q.—How can I keep cream from spoiling between shipments?

A.—Immediately after separating, place the can containing the cream in cold water so that the cream is below the surface of the water. The cream should be stirred occasionally to hasten cooling. Keep the container in cold water and in a storage place free from dust and odors until ready for market. Do not add warm cream to the cream that has been cooled as bacterial action of the cold cream will be stimulated and the quality of all the cream endangered. During the summer months the separator should be adjusted to deliver a 35 to 40 percent cream as high test cream keeps in good condition longer than that with a low test.
