Farm Question

Q.—Is it necessary to add minerals to the dairy ration when legume hay is fed?

A.—Legume hays, when grown on land not deficient in lime, will usually supply sufficient calcium for the average cow and an adequate supply of phosphorous can be secured from the grain ration provided it contains as much as 30 percent of feeds such as wheat bran, cottonseed meal and soybean meal. However, a good producing cow often draws on the mineral reserve stored in her bones, especially during the early part of the lactation period. For this reason it is best to add to each 100 pounds of concentrate ration ten pounds of a mineral mixture composed of equal parts of finely ground limestone and steamed bone meal. This mixture, together with that carried in the hay and grain, will be sufficient.

AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING \$2,000 REFUNDING SCHOOL BONDS

BE IT ORDAINED by the Board of Town Commissioners of the Town of Kings Mountain:

Section 1. That the Town of Kings Mountain issue its bonds, pursuant to the Municipal Finance Act, as amended, in an amount not exceeding \$2,000 for the purpose of refunding a like amount of the principal of valid subsisting bonded indebtedness of the Town of Kings Mountain, which indebtedness was authorized by a vote of more than a majority of the qualified voters thereon and is evidenced by the following:

\$2,000 School Building Bonds dated July 1, 1922, due July 1, 1940.

\$3,000 School Building Bonds dated May 1, 1925, due May 1, 1940.

Section 2. That a tax sufficient to pay the principal and interest of said Refunding School Bonds shall be annually levied and collected.

Section 3. That a statement of the debt of the Town has been filed with the clerk and is open to public inspection.

Section 4. That the holders of said Refunding School Bonds shall be subrogated to all the rights and powers of the holders of the indebtedness refunded thereby.

Section 5. That this ordinance shall take effect upon its passage and shall not be submitted to the voters.

The foregoing ordinance was passed on the 21st day of August, 1939, and was first published on the 24th day of August, 1939.

Any action or proceeding questioning the validity of said ordinance must be commenced within thirty days after its first publication.

\$19,000 GENERAL REFUNDING BONDS

BE IT ORDAINED by the Board of Town Commissioners of the Town of Kings Mountain:

Section 1. That the Town of Kings Mountain issue its bonds, pursuant to the Municipal Finance Act, as amended, in an amount not exceeding \$19,000 for the purpose of refunding a like amount of the principal of valid subsisting bonded indebtedness of the Town of Kings Mountain, which indebtedness was incurred for necessary expenses of said Town, and is evidenced by the following:

\$3,000 Local Improvement Bonds dated November 1, 1919, due November 1, 1939.

\$2,000 Local Improvement Bonds dated May 1, 1921, due May 1, 1940.

\$2,000 Water and Sewer Extension Bonds dated January 1, 1923, due January 1, 1940.

\$3,000 Water and Sewer Bonds dated October 1, 1923, due October 1, 1939.

\$2,000 Public Improvement Bonds dated February 1, 1925, due February 1, 1940.

\$5,000 Water Bonds dated June 1, 1928, due June 1, 1940.

\$2,000 Public Improvement Bonds dated November 1, 1935, due May 1, 1940.

Section 2. That a tax sufficient to pay the principal and interest of said General Refunding Bonds shall be annually levied and collected.

Section 3. That a statement of the debt of the Town has been filed with the clerk and is open to public inspection.

Section 4. That the holders of said General Refunding Bonds shall be subrogated to all the rights and powers of the holders of the indebtedness refunded thereby.

Section 5. That this ordinance shall take effect upon its passage and shall not be submitted to the voters.
