Important Triple-A Announcement Made

E. Y. Floyd, AAA executive officer of State College, made two important announcements this week which vitally affect the Agricultural Conservation Program in the State.

The first concerned the rate of 1939 conservation payment on cotton. A tentative rate of 2 cents per pound for the allotted acreage times the normal yield was announced last November. But, when more than 90 percent of the cotton growers in the Nation planted within their acreage allotments, it was found that insufficient funds to make the full 2 cent per pound payment were on hand.

The Agricultural Conservation Act allows for a deduction, or increase of not more than 10 percent in the payments when such a situation exists. If compliance had been below the estimated figures, there would have been an increase in payment.

Therefore, Floyd stated, the rate of payment on cotton will be 1.8 cents per pound for the allotted acreage times the normal yield, a 10 percent reduction in the rate of payment.

The other announcement by the Triple-A officer was the abandonment of the previously announced plan to make hairy vetch and Austrian winter pea seed available to farmers in 41 Eastern North Carolina counties as a grant of aid, similar to the lime and phosphate program in the State.

The plan was abandoned, Floyd said because of a seed shortage in the Pacific Northwest producing States, which caused bids on 5,512,000 pounds of seed sought by the AAA to be excessive.
