Radio Beams Used To Process Tobacco

Richmond, Va., Sept. 28.—(I.P.S.)—It looks as though American industrial research has scored again. This time it's the use of short wave radio for drying tobacco by new process. An engineer here has successfully removed moisture from tobacco with the aid of a 60,000 watt radio sending unit shooting radio waves through the leaves. Under the new method the tobacco is moved from the warehouse floor into hogheads, which are put in a heavy metal cylinder, which by use of steam becomes a vacuum. The radio waves are then shot through the tobacco.

While in the last 60 years the population of the United States increased only 2.6 times, factory wages were increasing 11 times, factory jobs 3 times, and the value of the goods produced in the country's factories 11 times.
