N. C. Births Show Slight Increase

RALEIGH, Oct. 30.—North Carolina's downward trend in births was checked, momentarily, at least, last month, when the total reported by the Vital Statistics Division, of the State Board of Health was 7,539, as compared with 6,919 in Sept., 1938, an increase of 660 in favor of Sept., 1939.

Deaths for the month, totaling 2,422, added up 20 more than in September last year, but the infant mortality rate for the month was only 64.4 as compared with 54.9 for the corresponding month last year, a drop of 8.5 points. Numerically, deaths among children under a year old decreased from 230 in Sept., 1938, to 220 in Sept., 1939.

The material death rate for the month was 4.4 as compared with 4.5 last year, a decrease of .1 in favor of September 1939.

OPEN HUNTING ATTRACTS MANY

Asheville, Oct. 31.—Open seasons on large and small game have proved an attraction for sportsmen from many sections of the United States now sojourning in the mountain region of Western North Carolina. Seasons on deer and black bear opened October first and open periods for bagging smaller game also were inaugurated on that date.

Hunters in this section and in other sections of the United States have in past seasons secured many deer and black bear in the mountain forests, a large number having been bagged each season during the Pisgah national game preserve hunt held over a period of years in the area. No announcement has as yet been made by National Forest officials as to whether a 1939 hunt will be held in the preserve.

The deer and bear seasons extend from October first to January first, with season bag limits being set at two bear and three deer per hunter. Smaller game seasons include opossum and raccoon, Oct. 1 to Feb. 15 with no season limit; rabbit, Nov. 30 to Feb. 15 with no limit; squirrel Oct. 1 to Jan. 15, ten per day and 150 season limit.
