



### Organization And Expenditures Of Kings Mountain School

For the education of the 1483 white children now enrolled in the Kings Mountain Schools there are three standard elementary and one accredited high school. There are 43 white teachers, exclusive of the cuperintendent, 40 State allotted, 1 paid by the County, State and Federal fundo for Vocational Home Economics, and two paid from local Thomoson the Association is expec

There ore 300 colored purils now envolled in the Davidson colored school. There are 10 colored teach-- 7 elementary and 3 high school - all allotted by the State.

In the white school there is one full time teacher of Vocational Home Economics, one for Commerce, one for Physical Education, one for piano, one for Bible, and a special supervisor of Public School Music in addition to the allotted teachers for the von'cus other school subjects.
