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Prospects Brighten For Good Crop Year

Looking at the 1940 agricultural picture in North Carolina from a production standpoint, prospects for crops are good, says E. C. Blair agronomist of the State College Ex tension Service.

For one thing, farmers have sown 130,000 acres in winter legumes, far greater acreage than ever before, If these legumes are allowed to grow and gather nitrogen until April and are turned under and fol lowed by corn, an increase of 10 bushels of corn to the acre, or a total of 1,300,000 bechels. should

Also Tar Heel growers had 911. 000 agres in lespedeza last year, As Miss Irene Holland of Charlotte lespedeza usually occupies the land Grace for two years, the chances are that only half this acreage will be used for another crop this year. If planted to corn, the land should produce A state of those of the act of their formerly. Roughly, this would mean an increase of 450,000 acres, or 4% 500,000 bushels of corn.

Blair said there is another reason why crops in the Piedmont should he good this year. The weather was unusually favorable for plowing dur ing the fall of 1939, and con quent Captain O. C. O'Farrel is visiting ly, nearly all land intended for corn cotton, and cowpeas was plowed be fore the end of December. This means that the soil has been, subfected to freezing, and thawing, which will thoroughly pulverize it before spring.



The freezes and thaws also was nelp to kill destructive insects, which gradually have been growing more abundant during the last two or three years of mild winters. Also, organic matter plowed . icfe the soil last fall has had all whater to decay, and more ef it will be usable by 1940 crops than would have been the case had plowing been de
