

Cold Weather Nips Ornamental Plants

Boxwood, peonles, ivy and other sinamental plants suffered greatly from the severe winter just past

and more particularly from the says Howard R. Garriss, assisstant Extension plant pathologist of N. C State College. He reports that more than 100 specimens of box plants suffering from cold injury have been received for diagnosis recently by the college plant disease laboratory. "The cold damage was especially evident in the piedmont section," Garriss decared. In most cases the killing out of plants took place where upx bushes were weakened and suffering the effects of the

drought last summer, or from other conditions."

The specialist said that fortunate snoots the short warm periods were the part of the day. greatest sufferers from sudden drops in temperature. Where only young shoots are killed, the plants calcium arsenate, one gallon should soon redover with continued warm weather.

Where only twigs have been killed, tre plant pathologist recommend that these be pruned out and the bushes be sprayed thoroughly with a 4-4-50 Bordeaux mixture every two weeks until continued hot wea

ther prevails. The reason for pruning out the dead wood, he explainea, lis to prevent parasites from living over and probably infesting the healthy wood. If diseases are present, the spray will tend to pre vent their spread.

Plants heretofore healthy and vig orous, but weakened by the cold weather, will be more subject to disease and they should be sprayed regularly during the current season.

Early Poisoning **Checks Weevils**

Pre-square poisoning to contro the boll weevil is expected to find a wider response from North Carolina cotton growers this year, says cold snaps" during the early spring J. O. Rowell, extension entomologist at State College.

Although the value of this early reatment as an aid in fighting the weevil is not fully supported by experimental evidence in North Carolina. South Carolina growers have reported good results from its use, Rowell said. Field demonstrations in North Carolina last season also indicoted good results for the meth-Liquid poloning by mopping has

cheap malasses, and one gallon of water. It is prepared by adding the arsenate to the water, stirring thor oughly, and then adding the molasses. This quantity is sufficient for

an acre of cotton. Only the amount needed for each day should be mixed at one time. It over-wintered weevils are numprous on the young plants, from one to three pre-square poison applications at 5 to 7 day intervals should he made. Treatment is advisable when weevils occur at the rate of or more per acre. Polsoning should be started just as soon 'as he souares begin to form, and before they are large enough for the weevils to puncture. The liquid mixture may be applied with a home-made mop. construct-

ed by tying a piece of cloth or sack to one end of a light board five feet, long and two to three inchehs wide. If rain occurs within 24 hours the treatment should be repeated.


