Ever-Normal Granary Now Includes Food

The United States Department of Agriculture has expanded its ever-normal granary program into a food program designed to assure ample supplies for the United States, Great Britain, and other Nations resisting aggression, says Dean I. O. Schaub, Extension director of N. C. State College.
 Under the expanded program, he says, the production of pork, dairy products, eggs and poultry will be stimulated thru the support of prices over the period ending June 30, 1943, at levels remunerative to producers. This will give North Carolina farmers an excellent opportunity to supplement their income thru the production of these products," Dean Schaub declared. It takes time to get into stimulated swine, dairy or poultry production, but the assurance that prices will be supported thru June of 1943 will overcome this normal difficulty.

The U. S. Department of Agriculture has announced that it will make purchases on the open market to support long-term prices (on a Chicago basis) at levels approximately as follows: Hogs, \$9 per hundredweight; dairy products, on a basis of 31 cents per pound for butter; chickens, 15 cents per lb.; and eggs, 22 cents per dozen.

It was pointed out that these prices will be subject to the customary commercial differentials for market grades and qualities. Seasonal price variations also will be taken into account.
 The Government's purchases on the open market will be used to

accumulate reserve supplies of food, Dean Schaub stated. These supplies can be used for transfer to the British and other countries under the provisions of the Lend-Lease Act; for release upon the market in case of unwarranted speculative price increases; to meet requests from the Red Cross for shipment to war refugees; and for direct distribution thru school lunch program or thru state welfare departments to public aid families.

Farm Questions

Q.—Can a treatment be used to control peach tree borers at this season of the year?

A.—Yes, if you failed to treat your trees last fall for the peach tree borer, fairly satisfactory control can be secured by treating the trees as soon as the ground warms up. J. O. Rowell, Extension entomologist of State College, recommends the use of either paradichlorobenzene or ethyl dichlorobenzene. For information on how to use these materials, and where they may be purchased, see your county farm agent.
