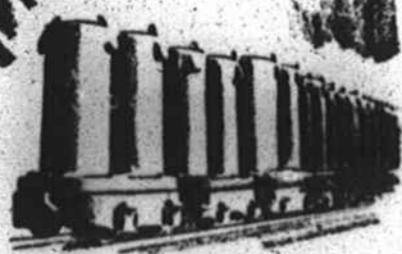


4 STEEL FACTS in one minute

Farmers Can Supplement Income By Growing Seed

A seed shortage is eminent in the United States, and A. D. Stuart, seed specialist at N. C. State College, says an opportunity is offered alert farmers of North Carolina to

supplement their income by saving grass and legume seed.

Joe Koonce of Jones County, a senior in agricultural education and editor of the "Agriculturist" magazine at State College, interviewed Stuart on the subject. The seed specialist said that seed supplies of several grasses and legumes can be produced economically in North Carolina.

With increased emphasis on pastures and soil-conserving crops, the student was told, North Carolina farmers will need more grass and legume seed to meet their soil-building requirements under the Agricultural Conservation Program.

Importation difficulties caused by the European War have reduced the supply of many of the seed which originally were shipped into this country in large amounts from Continental Europe, Stuart continued. Taking these two facts into consideration, there will probably be a shortage of many of the grass and legume seed. This will result in higher seed prices unless suitable sources of these seed are developed at home.

The State College specialist recommended that ryegrass, orchard grass, Kentucky bluegrass, white clover, red clover, alsike clover, crimson clover, low hop clover and hairy vetch seed be saved by North Carolina farmers. Dallis grass is another important pasture crop in the State, but locally-grown seed have a low germination due to disease. Consequently, the saving of Dallis grass seed is not recommended in North Carolina.

Lime and superphosphate have been responsible for doubling the yields on a meadow of N. F. Cheek demonstration farmer of the Galbreth Creek community of Swain County.
